PROPOSAL

NT Tennis, a thriving family club at Lytton Park, seeks to convert one under-used City croquet green into two new clay tennis courts to meet growing community demand.

Recommendations - Tennis and Pickleball Courts

31. Identify and evaluate under-utilized public courts in well-served areas for conversion to pickleball, club tennis or multi-use sport courts. Prioritize the establishment of pickleball courts in the short-term through re-lining projects based on demonstrated demand.

Lytton Park Conversion

Improved Public Access

- 2 new clay tennis courts replace one under utilized croquet green
- 4-8 additional players per time
- No cost to City (members funded)
- Enhanced access to families (allows 150 extra members over a season)

Considerate of Community

- > Open air courts / No bubble
- No evening lights
- Protects Idyllic Park, preserves one croquet court



NT Tennis Project Overview



- PUBLIC DEMAND: NT Tennis annual waiting lists turn away area families due to lack of space. Tennis Canada says the boom in popularity is nationwide - and growing.
- EXISTING FACILITIES: The City identified Lytton Park's two croquet greens (30 members) as 'under-utilized' making one of the greens ideal for conversion to ensure greater community use. The remaining croquet green will be preserved for the croquet club.
- > NO COST TO CITY: 100% funded by NT Tennis members, adding value to City facilities.
- > SAFETY: Park safety enhanced as NT Tennis monitors courts spring-fall, morning to night.
- CITY / COUNCILLOR ENDORSEMENT: Parks and Recreation Dept supports NT Tennis' proposal, pending additional community consultation. Previous councillor also supports plan.
- ENVIRONMENT: Clay courts ensure environmentally safe drainage and don't require pesticides or lawn maintenance currently provided by City for croquet club.

NT Tennis Club and Our Members

- Established 1936, currently serves 430 members of all ages.
- Family focused, with recreational, instructional and competitive programs for adults and juniors.
- Three courts, 7 days a week, Spring to Fall, free public access (non-members) on Sundays 4:30 pm to 10:30 pm.
- No parking lot required, most members cycle or are within walking distance.
- Capacity maxed, annual waiting lists turn away hundreds.
- Proposal for two clay courts adds capacity for 4-8 players per hour, extra 250 members over a season.



NT Croquet Club (NTCC) Overview

- > NTCC (Originally North Toronto Croquet & Lawn Bowling) established 1914.
- > Current membership of 30.
- > Dwindling participation, now only offers croquet.
- > Open Wednesdays & Saturdays, select hours Tuesdays and Sundays.
- NTCC hosts 3 international tournaments, with some members ranked internationally.



Parks & Environment Committee PE 29.1 Donation of New Tennis Courts at Lytton Park

MISINFORMATION

Croquet president Jim Wright falsely claimed to City Parks & Environment Committee, July 12, 2018:

- > NT Tennis plan at Lytton Park would see "huge influx of people 750 at once."
- Calls it "destruction of green space" that will "irrevocable change a green park into a paved cement pad."

CORRECTION

- 2 new clay tennis courts allow extra 4-8 players at any given time (150 new members over a season).
- Croquet courts are not "green space" but fenced off restricted lawns requiring costly City applications of pesticides, irrigation, aeration and maintenance.
- Proposed tennis courts are clay, ensuring environmentally sound drainage requiring no maintenance or chemicals..

NT Tennis membership fees have remained the same since 2014, offering relatively low-cost, healthy recreational activity for area families at prices below most area tennis facilities.
